Early Years and Wraparound Expansion

Role of Local Authority – EY&C

- To secure sufficient childcare for working parents.
- To secure early years provision free of charge, 570 hours of funded childcare per year for the most disadvantaged two-year-olds, 570 hours of funded childcare per year for parents of three- and four-year-olds (the universal entitlement), an additional 570 hours of funded childcare per year for working parents of three- and four-year-olds (the extended entitlement)
- To provide information, advice and assistance to parents and prospective parents.
- To publish certain sector information at prescribed intervals.
- To provide information, advice, and training to childcare providers.
- To improve the well-being of children under five and reduce inequalities.

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• To work with Health and Job Centre plus to deliver early years outcomes.



National expansion of Early Years Funded Entitlement and Wraparound Childcare (Primary)

- from April 2024, all working parents of 2-year-olds can access 15 hours per week,
- from September 2024, all working parents of children aged 9 months up to 3 years old can access 15 hours per week,
- from September 2025 all working parents of children aged 9 months up to 3 years old can access 30 hours free childcare per week, and
- 8-6 wraparound childcare for all primary aged children from September 2024.






The Cambridgeshire early years and childcare market is made up of private, voluntary and school managed provision. We also benefit from a strong childminding community. Expansion or development of provision should build upon and complement any existing local provision and must not impact on the sustainability of current providers.

National Wraparound Childcare Programme - *Early Adopter

As part of the childcare reforms announced at the 2023 Spring Budget:

The government's ambition is that by 2026, all parents and carers of primary school-aged children who need it, will be able to access term time childcare in their local area from Monday to Friday 8am-6pm.

This will enable parents to access employment, work a full day including travel time and will improve labour market participation.

*In Cambridgeshire work in underway for Summer Term in some areas

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Expectations of Schools and Trusts-Wraparound Programme

- Respond to their communities' needs for wraparound. There is an existing
 expectation that schools respond to parents' requests for wraparound childcare.
 Schools also have a duty to respond to childcare providers' requests to use school
 facilities to deliver childcare.⁵
- Report to their local authority where they have unmet demand. Schools should respond to requests from local authorities around demand for wraparound in their schools and inform local authorities where they have requests from parents that they cannot meet.
- Communicate wraparound options to parents. With the support of their local authority, schools should signpost accessible local provision to parents. This could be delivered by schools themselves, or by other childcare providers including childminders.





Expectations of All Providers- third party providers or directly managed

- Work collaboratively with local authorities.
- Respond to data collection requests from local authorities promptly.
- Adhere to statutory guidance, including to safeguard and promote the welfare of children.
- Ensure their provision is inclusive and has considered the needs of all children, including those with SEND and additional needs.
- Where appropriate, promote availability of government childcare subsidies to parents, including Tax-Free childcare and Universal Credit childcare elements.
- Where in receipt of funding for the programme comply with funding and assurance requirements as set out in the funding agreement with their local authority.
- Deliver provision that aligns with the quality principles, including the requirement for all private, voluntary and independent (PVI) providers to be Ofsted registered, or in the case of childminders, to be registered with Ofsted or a childminder agency. 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Wraparound Activity to date in Cambridgeshire

- Mapping of supply and demand surveys to schools and providers (including childminders), data analysed and collated
- Communication to all key stakeholders
- Identifying Early Adopter schools and settings
- Targeting schools with no provision and providers not meeting the full offer 8am-6pm
- Development of a grants process including capital grants
- Support to schools and providers to develop and expand high quality provision

The Smartest Monkey?

800,000 and 200,000 years ago something weird happened in a group of primates' brains.



Why do Children Skip?



Where does Play sit in the Brain? (Jaak Panksepp)



Where is the urge to play in our brains?

The limbic system is a very old part of our brain shared with all other mammals. It is responsible for many of our more primitive drives such as eating, sleeping and sex.

This system is important because it deals with the essential drives for survival.

Play is one of those essential survival processes.



When a child plays this is so important for survival that the brain rewards the child by releasing chemicals into the brain. In exactly the same way as we feel good when we eat nice food we feel good when we play. These brain chemicals are the equivalent of prescription drugs and have a street value.

PLAY PRODUCES

Oxytocin

(anti depressant, promotes bonding)

• **Opioids** (similar effect to morphine)

•GABA (anti depressant) •Benzodiazepines

(anti anxiety - brain's natural valium)

When children play, they produce a range of positive biochemicals similar to those produced when we eat. These biochemicals are essential for well-being and brain growth.

Starvation?

Depriving children of play is the biochemical equivalent of starving them.

Let our Children Play!





Curiosity also sits within the Limbic System and just like play is a biological and evolutionary survival process.

CURIOSITY

Nurturing is an instinctive need to protect and care for our vulnerable young. It is a two-way process producing a biochemical response in both the carer and the child.





Number of EHCNA requests agreed month by month





■ Number of new Mediation Cases






% pupils with EHCPs compared with statistical neighbours in primary schools



LA Stat neighbours




% pupils with EHCPs compared with statistical neighbours in secondary schools
