1.0 INTRODUCTION

- 1.1 The hourly rates for the early years free entitlements for 2-year-olds and 3 and 4-yearolds were announced in November 2021 as set out in the 2022 to 2023 early years <u>technical note.</u>
- 1.2 This paper shares the details of the most recent announcements with Schools Forum along with the rationale and proposed passporting of this funding.

2.0 2022/23 EARLY YEARS BLOCK ALLOCATIONS

2.1 For the vast majority of local authorities, the 2022/23 funding rates have increased from their 2021/22 allocations.

DfE funds local authorities on the same basis for both the universal 15 hours entitlement and the additional 15 hours entitlement for working parents. This is because the statutory framework and the quality requirements for the two entitlements are the same and therefore local authorities are expected to fund providers in the same way for both sets of hours and not to distinguish between the two. This means using the same hourly base rate and same supplements for both entitlements.

Additionally;

- EY Pupil Premium hourly rate has increased from 53 pence per hour to 60 pence per hour.
- Disability Access Funding has increased from £615 per year to £800 per year.
- 2.2 The indicative allocations for each local authority for the funding streams are calculated as follows:
 - The number of part-time equivalents (PTEs) taking up the entitlements as recorded on the January 2021 schools, early years and AP censuses.
 - This is multiplied by 15 hours * 38 weeks * each local authority's hourly funding rate.

The ESFA will update these initial allocations in:

- July 2022 based on January 2022 PTE census numbers
- July 2023, based on five-twelfths of the January 2022 PTE census numbers (to cover the April 2022 to August 2023 period), and seven-twelfths of the January 2023 PTE census numbers (to cover the September 2022 to March 2023 period)

This means that the final allocations for each of these funding streams will be based on (five-twelfths January 2022 PTE census numbers) + (seven-twelfths January 2023 PTE census numbers).

2.3 The final 2021/22 and initial 2022/23 funded allocations are shown in the table below. As you will see in the table below, despite an increase from the DfE of the hourly rate, the overall allocation for Peterborough for 2022/23 is slightly less than the 2021/22 figure.

3.0 2022/2023 FUNDING ARRANGEMENTS


3.1 As highlighted above, due to the reduction in the overall allocation, alongside the anticipated increase in the hourly rate, the local authority has worked hard to ensure that as much funding as is possible has been passported to the early years sector for the delivery of the early years funded entitlement. To enable this, we have had to increase the contribution from the high needs block to support the increasing needs in SEND and to minimise the contingency required.

This table over shows how the distribution of funding for 2022/23 has been calculated. The total hours are based on the Summer-21, Autumn-21 funding payments and projections for the Spring-22 term. A contingency of £200k is built in to cover any changes or adjustments to funding which have been identified following the 2022 Census. This also provides a level of protection to mitigate any future events or circumstance that cannot be predicted which will require additional funding to support the sector.

3.2 Local authorities can retain funding from the DSG Early Years Block to meet the required early year's central functions. During the 2017/18 funding reforms the government introduced a threshold for level of funding local authorities can retain. This centrally retained funding supports all the internal infrastructure functions required to deliver the early years funded entitlement to the sector, along with the practical support, advice and training for the early years and childcare sector in meeting and maintaining the requirements of the EYFS, Ofsted registration and inspection. The specialist SEND advice and support for the early years' service is also funded from this centrally retained funding.

This threshold is a percentage of the hourly rate used to fund local authorities. In 2017/18 the percentage was set at 7% decreasing to 5% in 2018/19. This threshold remains at 5% for 2022/23. The table over details the high pass-through calculation. In recognition of the financial challenges currently being faced by the early years sector the local authority centrally retained funding figure is at approx. 4%, which remains below the expected level from the DfE.



3.3 Action - Schools Forum is asked to support the proposed hourly rates and the funding allocations outlined in 3.1.

Early Years Pupil Premium (EYPP)	EYPP funding will continue in 2022/23 on the same basis as current arrangements. Qualifying 3- and 4-year-olds will receive the increased amount of £0.60 per hour for each eligible child. <i>Early years providers are responsible for identifying their eligible children</i>
Disability Access Fund (DAF)	 Providers can claim an annual payment of £800 (this is an increase from £615) for all 3- and 4-year-olds who meet both the following criteria: the child is in receipt of child Disability Living Allowance (DLA) and; the child receives free early education. Early years providers are ultimately responsible for identifying eligible children and should request evidence of the DLA in the form of the child's disability living allowance award letter. Where a child eligible for the DAF is splitting their free entitlement across two or more providers, the funding will be paid in whole to the setting the parent nominates as their main setting. A second payment cannot be claimed until the anniversary or after of the first claim. If a child receiving DAF moves from one setting to another within a financial year, the new setting is not eligible to receive DAF funding for this child within the same financial year. DAF funding received by the original setting will not be recouped.
Maintained Schools Supplementary Funding	Supplementary funding for maintained nursery schools has been made available to enable local authorities to maintain their current maintained nursery schools funding levels.
