Stages of Play

Article 31 of The UN Convention on the Rights of the Child

"...every child has the right to rest and leisure, to engage in play and recreational activities appropriate to the age of the child and to participate freely in cultural life and the arts."

Types and stages of play:

- 1. **Exploratory play** exploring an object using a variety of senses, e.g., mouthing, feeling, and hitting or banging it against something.
- 2. **Relational Play** making connections between objects or problem solving, e.g., putting a toy inside or on top of another toy, or banging two toys together to make a sound.
- 3. **Symbolic play** Using one object to represent another, e.g., using a pencil to bang a drum or using a cardboard tube for a telescope. Playing alongside other children (parallel play).
- 4. **Pretend play** Building sequences of play that is representative of their everyday and imaginary experiences often playing in association with other children but without a common goal, e.g., using a small world or dressing up clothes.
- 5. **Co-operative play** Play becomes organised and there is evidence of teamwork and rules being discussed and used, e.g., games and structured role play.
