

## Twelve rules of legibility

Children sometimes find it helpful to have specific rules they can refer to when trying to establish neat handwriting.

- I. Letters must be the correct height in relation to each other.
- 2. Letters that are meant to be closed must look closed.
- 3. Letters that are meant to be open must look open.
- 4. Straight strokes must look straight.
- 5. Curved strokes must look curved.
- 6. Parts of letters meant to be joined together must be joined, e.g. k not l
- 7. All parts of letters, such as loops and circles, must appear, also crossbars and dots on i.
- 8. There should be a difference between over-curves and under-curves.
- 9. Letters must be spaced so that it is obvious where one letter ends and another begins.
- 10. Finish one letter before starting the next.
- II. The joining strokes must be indicated, or enough space left, to show where one letter ends and the next begins.
- 12. The joining stroke must not distort a letter so that it looks like another or suggest an extra letter.
